What is Atonement: Blood

Jesus' crucifixion and death was in atonement for the sins of mankind. Atonement, what Jesus did to reconcile human beings with God, has many aspects to it and this lesson introduces you to one facet of the extent and depth of His work on the cross.

1. Unlike all other gods, the God of the Bible does not behave whimsically by His mood or emotion; God works within a judicial framework. To begin understanding the concept of atonement, you must be aware of His judicial process. What do you observe about God's standard?

And the Lord God commanded the man, saying, "You may surely eat of every tree of the garden, but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall surely die." (Gen 2:16-17, ESV)

For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Rom 6:23, ESV)

2. The word "atonement" is found only in the Old Testament. Use an online Bible dictionary to look up this word and write down the definition of atonement in your own words.

3. Blood is of particular significance to God. In Exodus 12, God instructed the Hebrews to sacrifice an unblemished male lamb and apply its blood to the sides and tops of the door frame of their homes (Ex 12:1-12). When God saw the blood, He passed over the homes of the Hebrews while striking down the first born throughout the land of Egypt. What do you observe in God's explanation of "atonement for your souls?"

"If any one of the house of Israel or of the strangers who sojourn among them eats any blood, I will set my face against that person who eats blood and will cut him off from among his people. For the life of the flesh is in the blood, and I have given it for you on the altar to make atonement for your souls, for it is the blood that makes atonement by the life. Therefore I have said to the people of Israel, No person among you shall eat blood, neither shall any stranger who sojourns among you eat blood. (Lev 17:10-12, ESV)

What is Atonement: Blood Teacher Notes

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By God's judicial standard, death is the penalty for sin. Sin is disobeying God's word in thought and / or action.

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The following is the first two paragraphs from the Holman Bible Dictionary on Atonement:

(uh tohne' mehnt), meaning reconciliation, was associated with sacrificial offerings to remove the effects of sin and in the New Testament,] refers specifically to the reconciliation between God and humanity effected by the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ.

Old Testament Primarily in the Old Testament, atonement refers to the process God established whereby humans could make an offering to God to restore fellowship with God. Such offerings, including both live and dead animals, incense, and money, were required to remove the bad effects of human sin.

Encourage a discussion with the student about the meaning of atonement. Stimulate their understanding with questions and help them gain an understanding God's prescribed method of atoning for sin.

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Ask the student: what is the significance of an animal's blood?

God reveals that blood represents the life of an animal.

Ask the student: what impact does it have on you when you must sacrifice an animal in atonement of your sin for your soul?

Help the student see this issue from two perspectives: God and ourselves and the different standards we choose to live by.

What does this tell you about God's view of sin?

What does this tell you about your view of disobeying God in thought and action?

Ask the student: what impact does it have on you when the cost of atonement of your sin for your soul is just a penny? What would that tell you about God's view of sin? What would that tell you about disobeying God in thought and action?
